Book Fair Problems

1. **Scholastic is not available** for our February SEP date. We could not switch from the third week of February (when we typically hold fairs) to the second week, because their warehouse will be maxed out.
2. Patrice, several teachers, and many parents, have expressed a lack of enthusiasm about the selection of books offered by scholastic.

Possible Solutions:

- We have researched the Story Cupboard—a local Salt Lake company, and Paper Pie company—an affiliate of Usborne books.
- Both are great fairs, but we would like to go with **Story Cupboard** because they offer more titles overall, but especially for middle school and chapter books.
- Paper pie has a really great reading incentive program that we might consider for the end of the year. Perhaps we could do a brief, end of the year reading program and/or fair where we encourage summer reading?

Discussion:

Where to hold this fair?

- Scholastic provides rolling carts with vertical shelves. This makes it so you can fit a maximum amount of books in one room. Neither Paper Pie nor Story Cupboard provide shelving.
- **Hold the fair in another location?**
 - **Gym 1 or 2**
 - Pros: could fit way more tables and books in gym 1 or 2
 - Cons: possibly a much shorter fair (only Thursday and Friday?) meaning no class or teacher preview (how will teachers request books?) can't set up until Wednesday after play practice or volleyball game? Will need table donations
 - **Cafeteria**

- Pros: could use existing tables for book displays! Setup Wednesday after lunch, teacher preview after school?
- Cons: Friday lunches in Gym 1? Or a picnic in the MPR?

- **MPR**
 - Pros: space can be available for an entire week, which would be nice to give teachers and students more time to browse with so many new and amazing titles. Volunteers and school employees get 20% off
 - Cons: Very small for the amount of books we will be receiving. Might feel chaotic. Expensive investment to purchase shelves, though we feel confident the book selection will make this an option we want to offer yearly. Would have to ask for table donations (borrow for a week?), forgo dum-dums for this fair? Possibly can't afford to give away so many books anyway.

- **Lion's Gate**
 - What missions are happening that week?

If we need more tables and/or shelving:

- There are \$30 shelves on Amazon, which are collapsible for storage and can hold at least 20-30 titles per shelf. We could layer these with tables.
- We will need 35-40 tables total.
