Essentially this means if federal tax changes cause the state's Income Tax Fund (which pays for schools) to drop by an amount that's as big as or bigger than what's needed to cover enrollment growth (more students) and inflation (higher costs), then this rule applies. Also has provisions to require students to meet personal care independence standards, regardless of grade level (also recognizes qualifying conditions); and provides reporting on curriculum development and implementation.
